

#### THE CORONER'S DAUGHTER: A CELEBRATION



In the atmospheric surroundings of Hugh Lane Gallery, Niall MacMonagle will be in conversation with author Andrew Hughes to discuss his journey from archivist to writer of historical fiction, and to explore the themes, settings, and characters of his novels *The Coroner's Daughter* and *The Convictions of John Delahunt*.








Copies of The Coroner's Daughter by Andrew Hughes (Transworld) are available to borrow from all Irish public libraries in physical format and in digital format as an e-book.
